ARCA Evolution-

At the December 1st meeting of the Amateur Radio Council of Arizona (ARCA), we discussed the need to consider the re-structure of support of Amateur Radio clubs here in Arizona.

With the recent changes in ARCA's responsibilities and activity, coupled with their experience with coordinating and supporting clubs across Arizona, we have the opportunity to increase the participation of clubs, as well as better coordinate events and promote activities across the state.

We are working on ways to urge 100-percent club participation and also to explain the benefits and needs that the Amateur Radio Council of Arizona can provide. We have begun including this discussion at club meetings across the state.

ARRL-AZ Section Manager Election-

The campaign for ARRL Arizona Section Manager is underway. There are two nominees who are running for the office, current SM, Rick Paquette (W7RAP), and the Arizona ARRL Public Information Coordinator, Virgil Silhanek (K7VZ). Ballots will be mailed to all Arizona ARRL members in early January, along with a description of each candidate's qualifications and background data. Ballots must be returned to ARRL before February 20th. The two-year term for the next Section Manager will begin on April 1st.

Distracted Driving Ordinance-

Early in 2019, we will be working with State Legislators to re-introduce a bill that acknowledges the need to exempt "Federally Licensed Government Operators" from any Distracted Driving Ordinances statewide. This verbiage is the most effective in protecting the rights of those of us who rely on mobile communications to conduct our activities, exclusive of cell phone and texting concerns which are so much an issue lately. The Statewide legislation would preclude Municipalities from enacting specific measures that prohibit mobile Amateur Radio use.

2018 A Good Year For ARRL-AZ-

2018 was an exciting and productive year here in Arizona, with activities and adventures all across the state. We continue to grow at an accelerated rate, and are seeing positive results of recent campaigns that improve our privileges and add protections to our use of equipment and activities. We have been successful in all of our challenges to reverse Distracted Driving laws, and also achieve recognition for our services to the State, County, Municipal, and Federal Government levels.

Many of our members have received awards and accolades for their devotion to public service, and this helps us justify our role in Emergency Support and Training, as well as being promoters and supporters of Civic events. We are demonstrating all across the state that Amateur Radio is so much more than just a "Hobby".

Next year we will continue to focus on growth among members and clubs, as well as improving communication among ourselves and the Public and the media about who we are, and how we help our community. We plan to re-introduce a statewide "Distracted Driving"
